

Introduction


The initial construction and subsequent widening of the Downtown Connector over the decades has displaced thriving Black homes and small businesses in Atlanta neighborhoods near the Stitch including Buttermilk Bottom, Sweet Auburn, and Old Fourth Ward. 


Creating an Equitable Community: Equity and the Stitch Master Plan


Equitable outcomes can be achieved by integrating equity strategies in the work streams of the master plan. Each focus area is assigned a unique suite of goals and measurements, including quantitative and qualitative strategies that identify a baseline and improvements.



The non-driving travel patterns map identifies transit, bike, and pedestrian activity of the lower income population. Communities to the West of the project use all three non-driving modes, while communities to the East walk or bike when not in a personal vehicle.



The socioeconomic map shows the baseline diversity in the project area. Indicators of diversity include race, non-citizen status, and limited English households. Equity communities are mostly to the West and South of the project site.



The housing security map explores risk of displacement in the project area. Indicators of affordable housing demand include renter occupation and population aged 65 years or older.
